

Project – NDC Succession Strategy

Charlestown & Lower Kersal New Deal for Communities (NDC) required assistance with its succession planning and required independent support in assessing the available options, enabling progression of a long-term strategy for community regeneration.



Key Actions

Pulse Regeneration undertook a detailed appraisal of the NDC's succession strategy, focusing on the extent of NDC asset ownership, the capability of existing delivery mechanisms, and local practice and current trends. From this best practice research was undertaken, different development vehicles reviewed, and options were identified for the way forward for the NDC. The review also raised a number of key issues and opportunities for consideration by the NDC board, and concluded with a series of realistic recommendations.

Achievements

- Independent review of options for succession with a critical, yet realistic, assessment of each
- Development of a detailed strategy to enable the NDC to continue its regeneration and impact through a legacy vehicle
- Facilitation of a series of research visits
- Gaining local buy-in and formation of a steering group to lead such a vehicle, while acknowledging Department for Communities and Local Government requirements and timescales.
